Gear List/What to Bring

Rio Salvaje is very remote. You can purchase certain items in the airport in Santiago, but the selection and availability is limited. Tobacco products, film, batteries and fishing gear should be purchased in advanced of your trip. Use the Santiago airport as your **last** supply stop.

We recommend water-repellant luggage with soft sides. Always have your rain gear near or at the top for easy access.

Weather in Chile is very unpredictable. Whenever you visit, be prepared for highs in the 80s and lows in the 40s. January and February are typically the warmest months, with cooler temperatures in November, December, March and April. Always be prepared for rain and wind. No Chilean goes anywhere without good rain gear. Camp clothing should be casual and comfortable.

Remember to keep all important medications separate from your luggage. Because we are exposed to the elements even around camp, warmth and dryness should be considered in all clothing choices. We recommend layering your clothing for warmth and versatility.

In-Camp Gear

- Jeans
- Long-sleeved shirts
- Sweater
- Socks
- Underwear



- Casual shoes
- Wading sandals (for fishing and travel)
- Light weight jacket
- Toiletries
- Camera
- Film or memory cards
- Camera batteries
- Books or games
- Alarm clock

On-River Gear

- Fleece tops and bottoms to wear under waders
- Polypropylene long underwear
- Sweater
- Vest or warm jacket to wear under your raincoat and waders
- Light weight pants “Flats” type w/zip-off pant legs
- Warm socks – several pairs
- Warm, waterproof and lucky fishing hat
- Warm fishing gloves
- Rainwear – Gore-Tex and other breathables are best
- Waders – Gore-Tex and other breathables are best
- Wading boots – please no studs as they damage boats
- Polarized sun glasses
- Sun block
- Bag for carrying your gear on boat (dry bags are best)
